Course Description:

Gill works with collage to create designs for textile print and one off artworks, in this workshop she'll share the techniques she uses for you to create your own striking collage. You'll start by making a set of painted textured papers using a variety of media including paints, pastels and watercolour pencils. We'll then use these lovely textured papers to cut and assemble the collage. Working with collage gives you the freedom to explore colour combinations and composition, allowing you to reposition motifs and play with form. The collage will be based on a scene that is personal to you, this could be a landscape, seascape or area of your garden. Please bring a reference with you to work from, this could be a photo, sketch or magazine cutting.

Gillian Ferguson studied textile design at the University of Ulster and worked as a textile designer in the textile print industry for 15 years. She now works as a surface pattern designer and art educator from her studio in Silverdale. To create designs for the home furnishing market she collages textured papers in Photoshop to form the motifs. As she loves to get her hands sticky she creates one off collages, working with found papers, papers from old books and painted textures.

What to bring
